

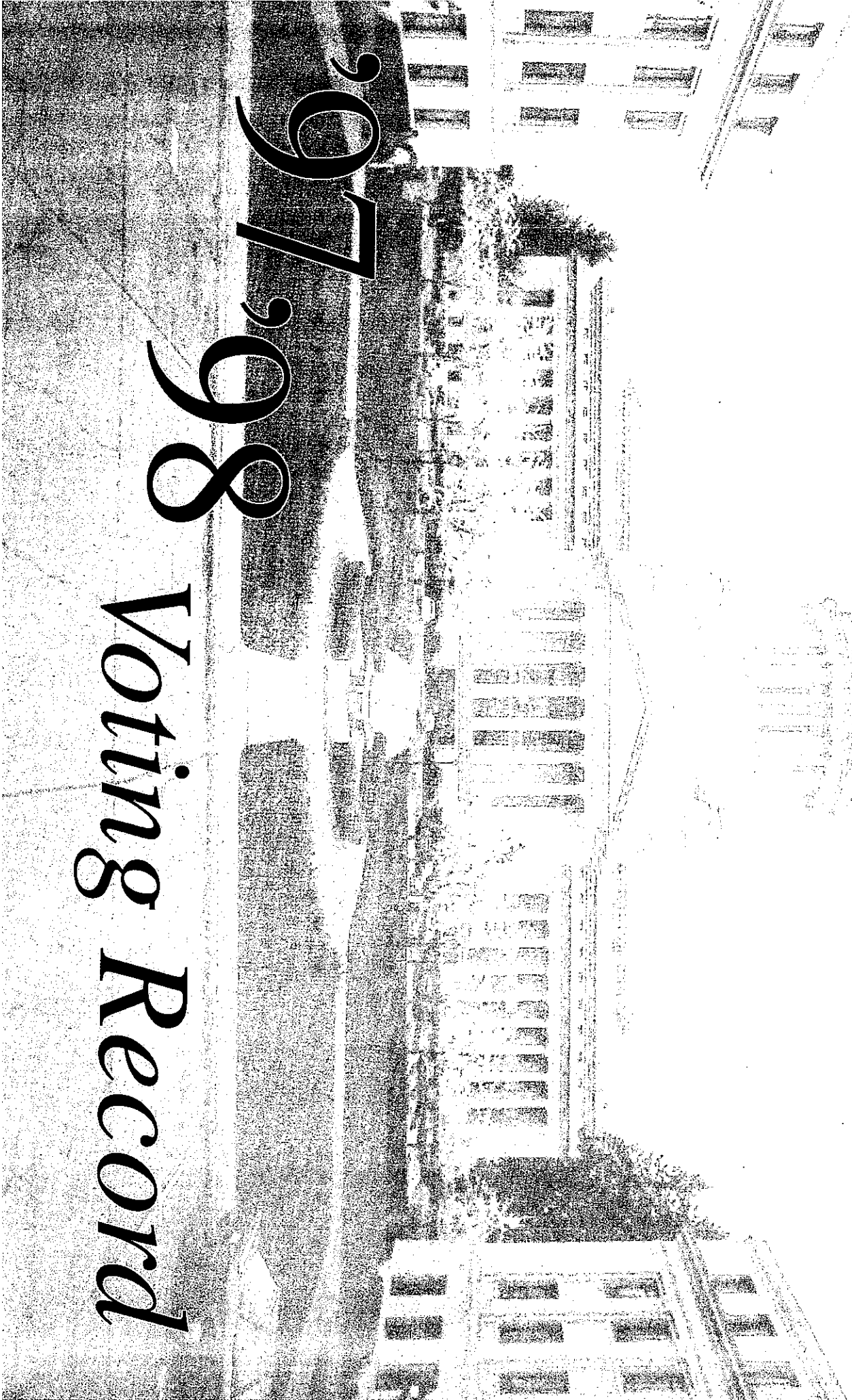

The AWB Voting Record

Voting records cannot tell the entire story of a legislator's attitude or whether the final vote on an issue accurately reflects that legislator's position throughout the debate. In order to provide the most accurate possible picture of each legislator's position, the AWB voting percentages are presented as two-year averages, factoring in each legislator's votes in 1997 and 1998. The term percentages for those Senators up for reelection were calculated in the same manner, factoring in each Senator's votes as featured in the 1995-96 AWB *Voting Record* and the 1997-98 *Voting Record*.

How the issues were chosen

The issues included in this *Voting Record* were selected by AWB members in a thorough and extensive process. First, a 25-member *Voting Record* Task Force reviewed the selection criteria and developed an initial list of issues. The proposed list and suggested format were then reviewed and approved by more than 80 members of AWB's Governmental Affairs Council.

The missing votes from the 1998 session

This *Voting Record* contains a listing of only those votes taken during the 1997-98 legislative session. It does not reflect a number of bills on important business issues which failed to come up for a vote in the 1998 session. For instance, bills on tort reform (HB 1804) and worker safety/reg reform (HB 1991) failed to come up for a vote in either the House or the Senate.

Check the record

AWB believes the votes included in this *Voting Record* are a fair representation of a legislator's tendency to support or oppose AWB's position on business issues. We urge you to carefully review how your legislators voted on an issue-by-issue basis, as well as by their composite percentage.

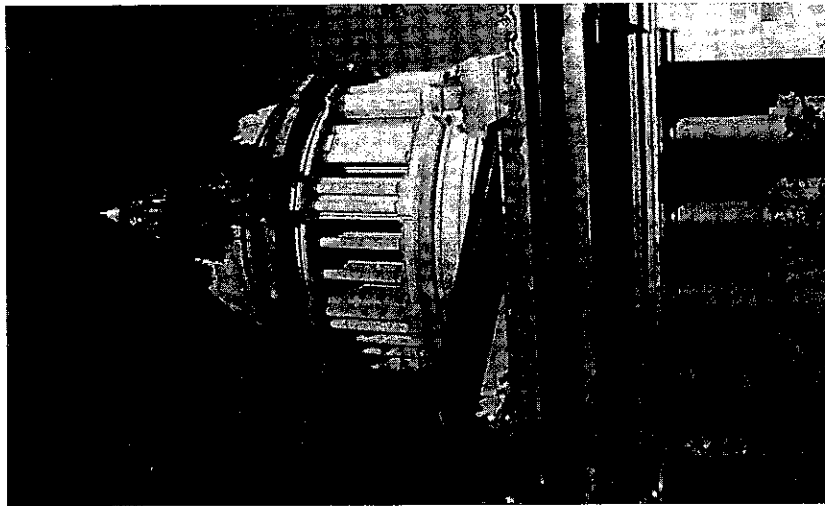

The important business legislation of 1997-1998

ENVIRONMENT

ESHB 1576 - VETOED (1997)

Buildable Lands Survey

To ensure communities have an adequate supply of buildable land, the House voted 62-36 and Senate voted 29-20 to require local governments to conduct surveys of available land suitable for residential, commercial and industrial development. This bill was vetoed by Gov. Locke. A "Y" vote reflects the AWB position.

ESHB 1866 - PARTIAL VETO (1997)

Environmental Excellence

The House voted 84-14 and the Senate voted 30-15 to allow companies and local governments to propose more effective or cost-efficient ways to meet environmental requirements, as long as the results meet or exceed current environmental standards. Gov. Locke signed the bill into law, but vetoed a section of the bill which would have exempted Environmental Excellence agreements from review under the State Environmental Policy Act (SEPA). A "Y" vote reflects the AWB position.

ESHB 2050 - VETOED (1997)

Water Rights Impairment

The Senate voted 31-16 and the House concurred 60-38 to establish a scientific standard to determine whether a new water right impairs an existing water right. Despite the bills bipartisan support in the legislature, this bill was vetoed by Gov. Locke. A "Y" vote reflects the AWB position.

2SHB 2054 - PARTIAL VETO (1997)

Local Watershed Planning

The Senate voted 25-21 and the House concurred 60-38 to give local communities a role in deciding their water use. Despite the fact this bill resulted from the cooperative efforts of local governments, tribes, businesses and environmental groups, Gov. Locke vetoed the majority of the bill. A "Y" vote reflects the AWB position.

HB 2091 - VETOED (1997)

Industrial Land Banks

The Senate voted 39-10 and the House concurred 64-34 to ensure continued economic growth by allowing counties to designate up to two locations outside urban growth boundaries for industrial and commercial development. Despite its bipartisan support, the bill was vetoed by Gov. Locke. A "Y" vote reflects the AWB position.

ESB 5185 (1997)

Growth Management (GMA) Hearings Boards

By a vote of 27-22, the Senate approved changes in the Growth Management Act to give more deference to local planning decisions, encourage cooperative mediation and change Hearings Board decisions from rulings to recommendations. ESB 5185 died in the House. A "Y" vote reflects the AWB position.

ESB 6094 - PARTIAL VETO (1997)

Growth Management (GMA) Reform

The House voted 62-36 and the Senate concurred 30-18 to approve this omnibus growth management bill designed to address problems with the implementation of the Growth Management Act. ESB 6094, as signed, makes several incremental improvements. But Gov. Locke vetoed sections not

endorsed by his Land Use Study Commission.

AWB believes those vetoed sections offered significant GMA reform. A "Y" vote reflects the AWB position.

ESB 7900 - SIGNED (1997)

Model Toxics Control Act (MTCA) Revisions

The Senate voted 43-1 and the House voted unanimously to approve this measure, which simplifies and expedites the sale of previously contaminated property. SB 7900 was signed into law by Gov. Locke. A "Y" vote reflects the AWB position.

SHB 2051- SIGNED (1998)

Hazardous Waste Remediation

The House and the Senate each voted unanimously to approve tax incentives designed to promote cleanup and re-use of land historically contaminated by hazardous waste. A "Y" vote reflects AWB's position.

SHB 2514 -PARTIAL VETO (1998)

Watershed Management

This measure was overwhelmingly approved by the House 86-10 and the Senate 43-4. HB 2514 establishes an optional process for local communities to plan for future water availability, instream flows for fish, and water quality.

A "Y" vote is consistent with AWB's position.

SHB 2830-PARTIAL VETO (1998)

Land Use Study Commission Recommendations

The House voted 98-0 and the Senate voted 42-1 to approve revised recommendations of the Land Use Study Commission. For AWB, the most important

provision of this bill continued the requirement that local governments process land use permit applications within 120 days. A "Y" vote reflects AWB's position.

SHB 2911 (1998)

GMA Integration

A bipartisan majority of the House voted 60-38 to support efforts to integrate SEPA and GMA. HB 2911 eliminated duplicate analysis and mitigation that extend permit processing and increase prices for homes and commercial construction. The bill died in the Senate Agriculture and Environment Committee. A "Y" vote reflects support for AWB's position.

SB 5185 - VETOED (1998)

GMA Authority Review

The Senate voted 27-21 and the House voted 56-40 in favor of limiting the power of the GMA Boards to overturn land use planning decisions made by local governments. Gov. Locke vetoed this bill in its entirety. A "Y" vote reflects AWB's position.

HEALTH CARE

ESHB 2018 - PARTIAL VETO (1997)

Market Stabilization Act

The House voted 66-32 and the Senate voted 30-19 to establish an annual 60-day enrollment window, provide incentives to maintain continuous insurance coverage, clarify emergency room coverage, establish standardized grievance procedures and add maternity benefits to the state's Health Insurance Pool. Gov. Locke vetoed the market stabilization provisions, but retained the added maternity benefits. A "Y" vote reflects the AWB position.

HUMAN RESOURCES

ESHB 1292 (1997)

Retro Reform Kline Amendment

By a vote of 22-26, the Senate rejected an amendment by Sen. Kline that would have allowed workers to file civil suits against employers in addition to obtaining relief under the workers' compensation system. An "N" reflects the AWB position.

SHB 1607 (1997)

PPD Closure - Conway Amendment

By a vote of 46-50, the House rejected an amendment by Rep. Steve Conway to require all self-insured workers' comp claims to be returned to the Department of Labor & Industries if the attending physician disagrees with the findings of an independent medical exam. An "N" vote reflects the AWB position.

SHB 1607 (1997)

PPD Closure - Fraser Amendment

By a vote of 23-25, the Senate defeated an amendment offered by Sen. Karen Fraser to require all self-insured workers' comp claims to be returned to the Department of Labor & Industries if the attending physician disagrees with the findings of an independent medical exam. An "N" vote reflects the AWB position.

SHB 1607 - SIGNED (1997)

PPD Closure - Final Passage

The House voted 56-40 and the Senate voted 27-21 to allow self-insured workers' compensation employers to close permanent partial disability claims. A "Y" position reflects the AWB position.

HB 1886 (1997)

Reference Checks

The House voted 58-36 to give limited immunity to employers who provide reference checks on current or former employees. HB 1886 died in the Senate. A "Y" vote reflects the AWB position.

HB 1887 - SIGNED (1997)

WISHA Advisory Committee

The House and Senate unanimously approved legislation to establish a joint business-labor advisory committee to make workplace safety policy recommendations to the Department of Labor & Industries. A "Y" vote reflects the AWB position.

HB 1911 (1997)

Teen Jobs

The House voted 55-39 to allow more flexibility in teen work schedules and reform the Department of Labor & Industries regulations which discourage employers from hiring teenagers. HB 1911 died in the Senate. A "Y" vote reflects the AWB position.

HB 1991 (1997)

Accident Prevention Plans

The House voted 56-39 to limit citations under an employer's accident prevention plan to infractions specifically covered by Department of Labor & Industries rules. HB 1991 died in the Senate. A "Y" vote reflects the AWB position.

SB 2093 - SIGNED (1997)

Family Leave Suspension

The Senate and House unanimously approved legislation suspending the state family leave law in favor of the existing federal family leave law. A "Y" vote reflects the AWB position.

SB 5569 - SIGNED (1997)**Retails Sales Overtime**

The Senate voted 33-16 and the House voted 61-36 to make the state's rules on overtime compensation for retail commission sales people consistent with the federal rules. A "Y" vote reflects the AWB position.

SB 5651 (1997)**Workers' Compensation Immunity**

The Senate voted 26-23 to clarify a recent Washington State Supreme Court decision which broadened the definition of "intentional acts," thereby leaving employers more vulnerable to civil lawsuits outside the workers' compensation system. The House rejected the measure by a vote of 47-49. A "Y" vote reflects the AWB position.

SB 5739 - VETOED (1997)**Wearing Apparel**

The Senate voted 32-16 and the House voted 75-23 to prohibit the Department of Labor and Industries from defining common everyday clothing as uniforms to be provided or paid for by employers. A "Y" reflects the AWB position.

SSB 6062 (1997)**Amend Budget - UI Surcharge**

The Senate voted 20-27 and the House voted 46-52 to reject amendments by Sen. Sid Snyder and Rep. Lynn Kessler to continue the UI surcharge for workforce training, which is scheduled to sunset December 31, 1997. An "N" vote reflects the AWB position.

HB 3031 (1998)**Unemployment Insurance Misconduct**

By a vote of 55-41, the House passed this bill which

would have clarified the definition of employee "misconduct" in connection with unemployment insurance benefits. The bill did not come up for a vote in the Senate. A "Y" reflects the AWB position.

SB 6536 - SIGNED (1998)**Wearing Apparel -Final Passage**

The Senate voted 48-0 and the House voted 97-0 to pass this compromise which clarifies which colors an employer can require workers to wear as part of a general dress code without having to compensate the employees. A "Y" reflects the AWB position.

SB 6699 (1998)**Job Reference Checks****Heavy Senate Amendment, Hicket House Amendment**

Similar amendments, defeated in the Senate 19-30 and in the House 46-51, which would have gutted the job reference bill and arguably left employers more exposed to litigation than they are now. A "N" vote reflects the AWB position.

SB 6699 - VETOED (1998)**Job Reference Checks Final Passage**

The House voted 56-41 and the Senate concurred on a 32-17 vote to pass this bill which would have provided greater immunity to employers who provide job reference information that is not knowingly false or deliberately misleading. A "Y" reflects the AWB position.

REGULATORY REFORM**E2SHB 1032 - PARTIAL VETO (1997)****Regulatory Reform**

The House voted 65-33 and the Senate voted 30-19

to approve comprehensive regulatory reform legislation which, among other things, restored the vetoed sections of the 1995 regulatory reform law. A "Y" vote reflects the AWB position.

SSB 5671 - VETOED (1998)**Agency Issuances**

The Senate voted 39-10 and the House voted 57-37 to restrict state agencies from issuing directives, guidelines or other statements as "defacto" rules without going through the public rule making process. SSB 5671 was vetoed by Gov. Locke. A "Y" vote reflects the AWB position.

E2SHB 2345 - PARTIAL VETO (1998)**Regulatory Reform**

By a vote of 63-32 in the House and 31-17 in the Senate, legislators approved this bill which would have written into law Governor Locke's executive order on regulatory improvement, which requires agencies to review their rules, clarifies that policy and interpretive statements are advisory only and requires agencies to notify employers of new requirements. Despite bi-partisan support, Gov. Locke substantially vetoed E2SHB 2345, removing the regulatory relief, but leaving minor technical revisions. A "Y" reflects the AWB position.

SB 6575 - SIGNED (1998)**JARRC Review of Documents**

The House and Senate unanimously supported this bill, which allows the Joint Administrative Rules Review Committee to review any state agency document, regardless of title, to see if it should be a rule. A "Y" reflects the AWB position.

TAX AND FISCAL POLICY**ESSB 5212 - VETOED (1997)
Property Tax Limitation**

The Senate voted 33-16 and the House voted 63-34 to limit annual increases in total property tax collections to 6% or inflation, whichever is less. The limitation applies to all state, county, city or other taxing jurisdictions with populations greater than 10,000. It requires a majority vote by officials to increase property tax collections any amount beyond the previous year's level. A two-thirds majority is required to increase collections beyond the inflation rate. And officials must hold a public vote to increase property tax collections more than 6%. Gov. Locke vetoed ESSB 5212. A "Y" vote reflects the AWB position.

ESSB 5286 (1997)

Intangibles Exemption - Loveland Amendment
By a vote of 23-26, the Senate rejected an amendment by Sen. Valoria Loveland to replace the original AWB-supported exemption bill with a version favored by county assessors. The assessor version would have prohibited separate listing and assessing of intangibles, but would have allowed them to be taxed within the overall business value. An "N" vote reflects the AWB position.

ESSB 5286 (1997)

Intangibles Exemption - Loveland Amendment
The Senate voted 23-26 to reject an amendment by Sen. Valoria Loveland to replace the original AWB-supported exemption bill with a mere study of the intangibles issue, postponing any action on an

exemption until 1998. This vote is included because this amendment would have essentially killed the intangibles exemption. An "N" vote reflects the AWB position.

ESSB 5286 (1997)

Intangibles Exemption - Loveland Amendment
By a vote of 24-25, the Senate rejected an amendment by Sen. Valoria Loveland that would have replaced the broad list of intangibles in the AWB-supported bill with a very limited list of intangibles and would have also excluded "controversial" intangibles such as franchise agreements. This vote is included because this amendment would have resulted in unequal taxation, which is against the state constitution. An "N" vote reflects the AWB position.

ESSB 5286 (1997)

Intangibles Exemption - Dunshiee Amendment
By a vote of 42-56, the House rejected an amendment by Rep. Hans Dunshiee to replace the original AWB-supported exemption bill with a version favored by county assessors. The assessor version would have prohibited separate listing and assessing of intangibles, but would have allowed them to be taxed within the overall business value. An "N" vote reflects the AWB position.

ESSB 5286 (1997)

Intangibles Exemption - Dunshiee Amendment
By a vote of 42-56, the House rejected an amendment by Rep. Hans Dunshiee that would have sunset the intangibles exemption in the year 2000. An "N" vote reflects the AWB position.

ESSB 5286 (1997)

Intangibles Exemption - Final Passage, House Vote
By a vote of 71-27, the House approved the intangibles exemption, which included Department of Revenue amendments acceptable to AWB. A "Y" vote reflects the AWB position.

ESSB 5286 (1997)

Intangibles Exemption - Motion to Concur
Normally, a motion to concur is strictly procedural, but in this case, opponents of the intangibles exemption called for a rollcall vote in a last-ditch attempt to kill the bill. The motion was defeated on a party line 25-23 vote. A "Y" vote reflects the AWB position.

ESSB 5286 (1997)

Intangibles Exemption - Senate Concurrence Vote
By a vote of 30-19, the Senate voted to concur with the House in approving the intangibles exemption. A "Y" vote reflects the AWB position.

SB 5334 - SIGNED (1997)

Guarantee Fund Offset
The House voted 76-21 and the Senate concurred 37-9 to reinstate a premium tax offset for monies contributed by insurance companies to the insurance guarantee fund. A "Y" vote reflects the AWB position.

SSB 5574 (1997)

Property Tax Reform - Spanel Amendment
SSB 5574 encompassed a variety of technical changes in the tax code. By a vote of 35-14, the Senate approved an amendment by Sen. Harriet Spanel to remove a requirement that assessors annually revalue properties in order to more accurately reflect their actual value. An "N" vote reflects the AWB position.

TAX AND FISCAL POLICY, cont.

SB 5835 (1997)

Property Tax Referendum Snyder Amendment

By a vote of 23-26, the Senate rejected an amendment by Sen. Sid Snyder to establish a homestead tax credit as part of property tax reform. The exemption would have created a split tax roll. An "N" vote reflects the AWB position.

SB 5835 (1997)

Property Tax Referendum Clause

To counter Gov. Locke's veto of ESSB 5212, the Senate voted 30-17 and the House voted 60-38 to approve SB 5835, a virtually identical bill which includes a referendum clause, sending the measure directly to the voters on the November ballot. In addition, SB 5835 includes an earlier measure vetoed by Gov. Locke which permanently extends a temporary 4.7 percent reduction in the state's portion of the property tax. A "Y" vote reflects the AWB position.

SB 7902 (1997)

B&O Tax Rollback - Snyder Amendment

By a vote of 22-25, the Senate rejected an amendment by Sen. Sid Snyder to delay the effective date of the rollback one year to July 1, 1998. An "N" vote reflects the AWB position.

SB 7902 (1997)

B&O Tax Rollback - Final Passage, Senate

By a vote of 44-3, the Senate approved the B&O tax rollback. A "Y" vote reflects the AWB position.

SB 7902 (1997)

B&O Tax Rollback - Cody Amendment

By a vote of 39-59, the House rejected an amendment by Rep. Eileen Cody to delay the effective date of the B&O tax rollback one year to July 1, 1998. An "N" vote reflects the AWB position.

SB 7902 - VETOED (1997)

B&O Tax Rollback - Final Passage, House

By a vote of 91-7, the House approved the B&O tax rollback. A "Y" vote reflects the AWB position.

SB 7902 (1997)

B&O Tax Rollback - Motion to Override Veto

Following Gov. Locke's veto of SB 7902, the Senate, by a vote of 26-23, failed to achieve the two-thirds majority needed to approve Sen. Stephen Johnson's motion to override the governor's veto. A "Y" vote reflects the AWB position.

EHB 2894

Transportation Funding (1998)

The House voted 56-41 and the Senate voted 25-24 to send a transportation funding proposal to the people as Referendum 49. The referendum will cut the car tax by \$30 per vehicle, transfer Motor Vehicle

Excise Tax (MVET) monies to increase the transportation fund, increase and stabilize funding for local criminal justice and rural economic development, and allow for \$1.9 billion in new bonds for transportation projects. The proposal is the cornerstone of a \$2.4 billion transportation plan for the state of Washington. A "Y" vote reflects the AWB position.

SHB 3073

Prevailing Wage Reform (1998)

The House voted 96-0 to require that a more scientific survey method be used to establish prevailing wage rates. A more accurate wage survey would have brought direct cost savings to public works projects. SHB 3073 died in the Senate. A "Y" vote reflects the AWB position.

The chart below shows how your Senator voted during the 1997 and 1998 legislative sessions. The shaded area represents the percentage of votes cast in favor of AWB's position.
